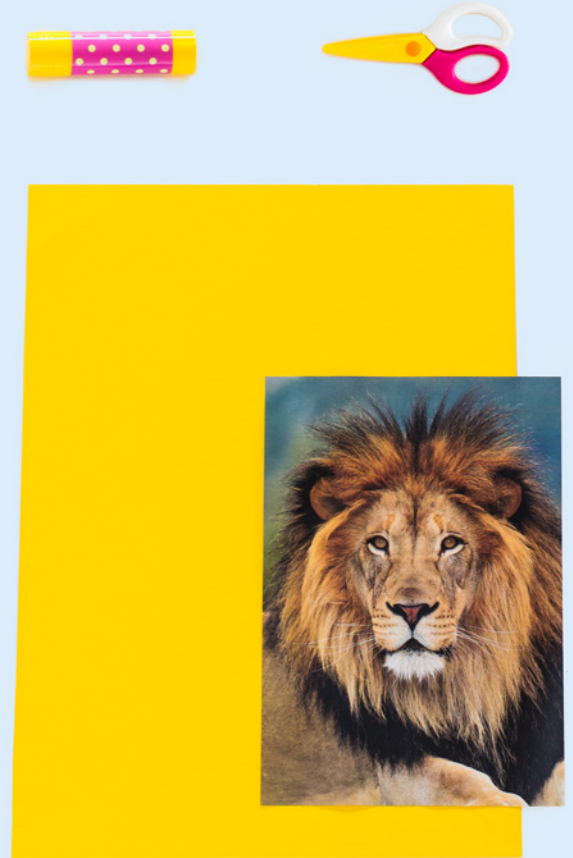

Silhouette drawing

Sangeeta Sandrasegar says shadows are like magic, because they are always on the move and can never be caught. A silhouette looks a bit like a shadow. It is an outline of something, and usually appears as a solid black shape.

Work with a friend or family member to capture their silhouette!

An A3 or larger, piece of paper

Sticky tape

A torch

such as glitter, sequins, coloured paper

Create

Tape a piece of paper to a wall and ask someone to stand or sit in front of it.

Shine a light onto your model until their shadow appears on the paper.

TIP You may find that you create a clearer shadow if you are in bright sunlight or a slightly darkened room.

TIP

If your model sits sideways you will have more detail to draw.

Trace the outline of their shadow onto the paper.
